Cycling Adventures

Their first adventure took them to the National Trust's Wallington Hall, where pupils explored the property's purpose-built cycle tracks. For many, this was their first time cycling outside Wingrove and staff were thrilled to see their confidence and skills grow throughout the day. Next, they headed to Blyth Beach to tackle the newly completed traffic-free cycle route that runs from St. Mary's Lighthouse all the way to Tynemouth. The



original plan was to finish at Spanish City, but the pupils were doing so well that they extended the ride to Cullercoats Bay, where everyone enjoyed a well-earned lunch on the beach. The route offers stunning coastal scenery and we highly recommend it for a family day out! These trips were a fantastic way to celebrate the progress our pupils have made. Well done, Year Five!

It was quite tricky to catch some of the creatures, but we did manage to catch some small fish, crabs and prawns. We made sure we carefully returned them to their habitat after we'd looked at them. Some of us were chosen to dress up as people who worked at lighthouses, such as the window cleaner so the lighthouse keeper could see the ships. Preparations are already under way and pupils have started attending an after-school fitness club to build stamina

Bikeability training and recently tackled the first of five training rides —
an impressive 11-mile journey from Newburn to Prudhoe in wet and
cold conditions. Their resilience shone through as they pedalled on
without a single complaint! As part of the Turing Scheme, all Year Five
pupils have been paired with a pen pal from our Dutch partner school,
Kindercampus Zuidas. In class, pupils have been exploring Dutch
culture, sampling traditional treats like stroopwafels and poffertjes, as
well as learning more about life in the Netherlands. We can't wait to
