## Our Trust Year 2020-2021

The West End Schools' Trust (WEST) is a charitable company of eight primary schools and partner organisations located in the inner west of the city of Newcastle upon Tyne. The primary schools included in the Trust are: Bridgewater, Broadwood, Canning Street, Hawthorn , Moorside, St John's , St Paul's Church of England and Wingrove .

Our Trust was formed in January 2015. We are responsible for the education of nearly three thousand pupils and employ almost three hundred teachers, teaching assistants and administrative staff.

When pupils leave our schools they are well prepared for the next phase of their educational journey. All of the schools are unique and although they may vary in size and context, Ofsted inspections for the cluster reveal effective schools that work in collaboration for the benefit of the whole of the community.

### Teacher Development Fund

We entered our third year of partnership with Tyne & Wear Archives and Museums (TWAM).

The Teacher Development Fund from Paul Hamlyn Foundation supports teachers to work with local arts and cultural resources to increase learning opportunities for pupils.

Teachers from WEST schools together with Hadrian Primary in South Shields and Western Primary in Wallsend have been supported by museum staff and artists to draw on inspiration from museum collections in order to support pupil's speech and language development through enquiry based learning approaches.

Our staff across the Trust regularly meet to share ideas and training and run Trust wide projects.

## Message from the Chair

After a prolonged period of unprecedented disruption to education (with all the adverse consequences for both children and families that follow) WEST schools have returned to something which resembles normality but under a new dispensation of partly online teaching, on site 'bubbles', repeated testing and periodic isolation, the ongoing disruptive effects of which must be acknowledged.

Throughout the year (both in term and out), schools have continued to provide critical support for families.

WEST initiatives such as STEMtastic and the Health and Wellbeing Week have been delivered with partners recently with great success but under real practical constraints.

We must hope that such constraints continue to loosen gradually to allow all children to return to school all the time and that a full range of school activities can resume.


Admiration for all staff should be unbounded for their patience, resilience and commitment to their children, families and each other.

We are supporting The Voices project which is exploring the challenges faced by young people by listening to their feelings

and experiences and advocating for them in order to help policymakers take action.

Ailsa Fenwick became a Partnership and Participation coordinator working with WECC. Her role includes helping partners in our community come together to offer support the young people who live here.




## Health and Wellbeing

This project is intended to promote engagement between young people and those in a care home. Children and residents have been introducing themselves to each other in creative ways. They are all enjoying getting to know each other. It has been a great opportunity to learn more about the people in our community and to share common interests and talent across the ages
