We have had an increase in children arriving to school late. Children start learning as soon as they are in class, so your child is missing out when they arrive late. We continue to work towards our goals regarding attendance and punctuality as we believe this gives children the best education. Attendance lower than 95% can significantly impact upon your child's learning.

Overall Punctuality

Last term, we had **267** lates, a total of over **54 hours lost learning.**

Please ensure you get your child to school on time.



Overall attendance

Children in primary school are expected to have attendance above 96%.

Our target for the whole school is set by the government and the local authority and we are expected to reach at least 96% this academic year. Last term we achieved 94.1%. We need to work very hard to improve this.

Phoning to report an absence

Please phone before 9.00 the first morning your child is absent. Leave a message on the absence line. It is important to state your child's full name, the name of their teacher and the reason for their absence.

Although we strive for good attendance for all children, we understand that everyone can be ill. If your child is too unwell to come to school, then please phone the school on the number below:

Illness

All children at some point are ill, which means that they cannot attend school.

If your child has sickness and diarrhoea or a high temperature then they cannot attend school. However, if your child has a minor complaint such as a runny nose, mild cough or sore throat, then they could attend school. Last term **899** days were been missed due to illness.



At the end of the school day

Picking your child up on time at the end of the day is just as important as getting them to school on time.

Please remember school finishes at **3.15**. Afternoon nursery is **3.30**. If, on occasion, you may be late picking your children up, please ring the school office.





Holidays and leave of absence in term time

We continue to work with the local authority in relation to issuing fines for holidays taken in term time. This is an increasing problem, we feel our children should not miss out on their education. Last academic year we had 113 children missing 749 days due to holidays.

Last term **34** pupils contributed to **245** days of missed learning through holidays.

We also have **Golden Time** every week for the class who have the fewest lates. The children have a selection of board games to play with their classmates.








100% Attendance Draw

It also promotes health and wellbeing when we get out and about instead of taking the car on such short journeys. But, ultimately, we could support the reduction of dangerous pollutants at and around our school gates when engines are cold and cars are brought to school unnecessarily. Please make the extra effort as the summer approaches. The majority can travel to and from school without using the car. Let's see if we can all make the effort. Finally, I would like to thank Mrs Prosperini for her enormous efforts to improve attendance in our school.
