

Summer Newsletter



We bid a farewell to children and staff leaving us this week and wish them all the best in their futures. We look forward to hearing all about their further successes. We also welcome two new teachers to our team. In Year Five we welcome Mr Wilson and in Year Two we have Miss Armstrong. We also have new support staff joining us in the new year. We have Mrs Simpson and Mrs Van Rossen in nursery and Mrs Fairholm in Year One. They will bring a wealth of new ideas to our wider team from September onwards. Further detail about the staffing structure will come home in the form of a letter before the end of term.

The children and staff have worked exceptionally hard this year and our results have shown dramatic improvements in maths, early years outcomes and Year One phonics. There were 77% of our reception pupils who achieved a good level of development and 85% of our Year One pupils achieved the pass rate (32/40) in the phonics test.

"First of all, we went to the museum and when we got there, we were ushered into a Roman classroom. Velius, our new holographic teacher, taught us about the Roman alphabet and Roman numerals. We enjoyed looking at scutums (shields), clothing and different foods that they ate. We all had a turn of the bow and arrow game to see if we would meet the standards of the Roman army. One of our arrows hit the target that was 240 metres away. Perfect! After lunch, we went back into the museum and got to experience a 3D movie about the Roman Empire. We all looked funny wearing the special 3D glasses. After the short film, we went to Vindolanda and listened to one of the archaeologists at the site, Penny. She informed us about their recent finds and we were able to see some old Roman shoes that belonged to children. It was amazing to see them when you consider how old they were. Also at Vindolanda, we looked around the site and spotted where the old headquarters would have been, as well as their old roundhouses.
