I continue to update our school's risk assessment each time the Government updates the guidance and we will share with you any changes that may affect our school community. The latest guidance is urging all people over the age of eighteen to book their third vaccination (booster) in order to further protect everyone against the spread of COVID. The advice also suggests that children in primary schools, from the age of five, can use lateral flow tests if they are identified as a close contact of someone who tests positive for COVID. Can I suggest that you go online to order some lateral flow tests to keep at home in case you should be advised to use them. The link is: <u>Order corona-virus (COVID-19) rapid lateral flow tests - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</u> Demand has been quite high since the guidance was recently updated, but you can also organise to have a code sent to your phone and then you can use this to collect packs from a pharmacist. You can use the above link for both.

<u>Art Club</u>

A group of Year 6 children are taking part in an art after school club, which is researching, exploring and understanding children's views and experiences of belonging, wellbeing and inclusion. They talk about a variety of topics including identity, race, culture, language, religion, acceptance, peer/ school relationships and other related things that the children feel are important to them. The group are invited to share their thoughts, perspectives and

experiences of belonging, wellbeing and inclusion through a selection of art tools including drawing, painting, collage, crafts and creative writing. Then, participants will be invited to be 'researchers' to help analyse the data and look for themes, ideas, similarities and differences. This will involve group discussions and exploration through dance and drama.
