Welcome to the spring edition of our newsletter for this academic year. We have had a wonderful term. You will read about most of the learning in this newsletter, but we could not possibly fit everything in. As you may be aware, we were successful with our Turing application once again and we have been able to arrange two fully funded visits overseas, one to France and another to the Netherlands. We have been very busy practising on our bikes in preparation for the Netherlands trip. We have been using our own bike track, but have also been to the coast and through the city centre to try and build our strength. We always receive positive feedback from the places we visit and I often receive emails and phone calls in praise of our wonderful pupils and how smart and wellmannered they are. It is fabulous. We have also celebrated Chinese New Year, and have welcomed Lip Lee back to school on his annual visit where he has run workshops across the school. We also celebrated the festival with a Chinese-style free school lunch for the whole school. The Nursery pupils received fortune cookies and prawn crackers as they do not stay for lunch. We have this year been working with JJ Coaching to run holiday clubs. The first one took place in the Christmas holidays, we were able to offer a fully funded fun-packed four day holiday camp which was well attended. We have invited JJ Coaching back to run the same camp during the Easter holiday. It will run in the second week and will be aimed at children from Y2 to Y6 and will run Monday 8th to Thursday 11th April from 10am to 2pm each day. Children will also receive a meal each day they attend. Some of you have already signed up for this, but check Seesaw for the link if your child would like to take part. The maximum number is 40. This week we will also be holding the annual Easter egg competition. Children should bring in their creations on Wednesday and place them on tables in the hall. We will then choose first, second and third place and children can then bring home their entry, and their Easter egg prize, if they are lucky enough to win one. This year our staff team has donated enough Easter eggs that we are able to offer a first, second and third prize to each class from Nursery to Y6, which is great. Thank you to everyone for their kind donations. Thank you too to all of our families who have generously donated food items for the local food bank. The team at the West End Food Bank were so grateful for everything we provided. Times are very difficult for some people in our local community and your donations will really make a difference. I am so proud of our School Council who came up with the idea in the first place. They are so mature and this act demonstrates the empathy they have for others. Their work on minimising the litter situation has also been really effective. Thank you for supporting our young people who really care about our local environment and the people who live in it. Now that Lemington Riverside Primary School has joined our trust, our children are really enjoying meeting new people and widening their circle of friends. You will receive a message on Dojo and Seesaw with regard to an additional training day we are having this year. It is Friday 14th June. School will be closed to pupils as staff will be having a training session on how to use technology to raise standards. We will be working with Mr P again and we have coordinated this as a trust-wide training package.

STEMTASTIC WEEK

"This term, Year Six have enjoyed a Stemtastic Week at NUCASTLE – Newcastle United Foundation, the Centre for Life and the Discovery Museum. At NUCASTLE, we coded robots to shake, make noises and countdown from 10 to 0. We also visited the gaming room and got to play video games. We really enjoyed our visit to the foundation. At the Centre for Life, we made paper aeroplanes and tested how far they flew. There was a competition to see how far your plane could fly and the winner's plane flew 9.87 metres! After that, we explored the planetarium and we saw how The Earth orbited around The Sun. We learnt how other planets orbit at various speeds and that on other planets we would be different ages. Afterwards, we inspected a murder mystery and we gathered information to see which suspect was the murderer. For the final trip, we ventured to the Discovery Museum. Here, we made boats to see how well they stayed afloat. We held a competition and the winning boat stayed afloat for 18 seconds when weights were placed on it. Next, we made switches to trigger lights using copper tape, as a conductive material, and a battery that powered the light. We then made an object similar to a camera and learnt how the



eye works. We were surprised to see that the light that was projected on the window showed us images in our camera. After that, we used Morse Code to send messages to each other using Lego and lights. Finally, we were free to explore the museum and we all had a really great time. LEGO EDUCATION

You may well remember we had oodles of Lego Education delivered to us, that we had training on it and started an after school club too, with ten Lego wizards, back in December. In January, we moved onto working with Lego Prime and the Spike robot. "We've been working diligently and have learnt an incredible amount, ready for our competition on the 13th March. This was our chance to showcase everything we had learnt about Lego Education Spike: we had our robots, including their attachments; our innovation projects about augmented reality in the home; our masterpiece mats and models; and a whole lot of excitement! Each team had three separate attempts to generate as many points as possible within a three minute timeframe. We had been told that 120 points would be an excellent first time score. How did we do? Wingrove Spike Squad's best score: 130 points; Wingrove Lego Engineers' best score: 150 points! Incredible! We also had to present our innovation projects and robot designs to the judges. The group were phenomenal! One of the judges said that one of our team's presentation was 'outstanding' and 'one of the best they have seen in three years.' Finally, came the awards ceremony. We were very excited to celebrate everyone's achievements as some of the robot designs we had seen were remarkable, not to mention scores as high as 225 points! But then came a special moment: a second judges' award had been created 'because we [the organisers] felt one team needed special recognition' as they had an excellent performance all round but 'had just been pipped by another team in each area.' The winners of the second judges' award? Our very own Wingrove Lego Engineers! Wahoo! At the day's conclusion, the overall winners of the day were the Wingrove Spike Squad and incredibly in second place were the Wingrove Lego Engineers! We can't believe it! We are Regional Champions!
