Welcome to the final newsletter for this year, where we bid a fond farewell to some of our Wingrove family, whilst welcoming new members. The children and staff have worked exceptionally hard this year and our results have shown improvements in reading, writing and maths at greater depth standard across KS1 and KS2. Our early years outcome is also good and year one phonics, whilst being lower than last year, shows really good progress for all the children. The fact that we have the biggest number of children achieving greater depth standard would reflect our continued focus on the mastery curriculum. The table below has these results in more detail:

Visits and Visitors

"In the penultimate week of term, Year 3 visited Newcastle University for a Music workshop. We met Simon and his team off the coach and walked through the beautiful campus to a grand hall. First of all, we listened to a piece of music called *The Carnival of the Animals* and we had to guess which animal it represented. My favourite part was about a lion. After that, we looked at dynamics and had to match the names to the different types. Then, we looked at pulse and rhythm and practised this through a series of clapping tasks. In groups of 4, each person took a different rhythm and played it to make a tune, before performing it to everybody. To end, we learnt to read music and we played a piece of music by Beethoven using a boomwhacker. The boomwhackers were different lengths and colours and because of their different lengths, it meant that they could play different notes. Playing the boomwhackers was definitely the best bit of the workshop!" – Alae, Y3.





"One of our final trips in Year 4 is also one of my favourites and I am sure all of the children will agree too. As a culmination to our topic about rivers, we visited Gibside (National Trust) to explore the magnificent estate and identify some of the key features of the River Derwent, which runs through the estate.

While we were at Gibside, the children showed great resilience and determination as we hiked around the estate, which has some very challenging hills to conquer. We also investigated some of the old buildings there like the orangery and the stables. The children also had the opportunity to investigate the meadows, take part in an assault and a low ropes adventure course.

As part of Year 3's topic about 'Where Will the Time Machine Take You?' they visited The Roman Army Museum and Vindolanda near Bardon Mill in the second part of the term, to further their learning about The Romans. "First of all, we went to the museum and when we got there, we all had a turn of the bow and arrow game to see if we would meet the standards of the Roman army. One of our arrows hit the target perfectly; it was 240 metres away! We then looked at the different weapons the Romans used and the types of scutums (shields) that they used to defend themselves with. Following this, we were ushered into a Roman classroom. Velius, our new holographic teacher, taught us about the Roman alphabet and Roman numerals. Before lunch, we went into the small cinema area and got to experience a 3D movie about the Edge of the Roman Empire, along Hadrian's Wall. After lunch, we went to Vindolanda and listened to one of the archaeologists at the site, Lauren. She informed us about their recent finds and we were able to see some old animal skulls and shoes that had belonged to children. It was amazing to see them when you consider how old they were. Also at Vindolanda, we looked around the site and spotted where the old headquarters would have been, as well as their old roundhouses. It was a great trip and it helped us learn so much more about the Romans." — Areeb and Ibrahim, Y3.

Year 1 enjoyed a fabulous trip to the Great North Museum where they explored dinosaur fossils and learnt more about the role of a palaeontologist. "We saw a Tyrannosaurus Rex skeleton and many other interesting fossils from pre-historic times. We then came back to school and made our own dinosaur fossils using salt dough and papier-mâché. The CTRL Pad

"This term, six lucky pupils from Year 3 were selected to go to The CTRL Pad in The Gate on a Tuesday morning to work with Jim and Ramsay. The aim of our sessions was to create an app to use on a phone or iPad. We decided to make an app about The Solar System. First of all, we had to draw each planet on a piece of paper and then Jim showed us how the app would connect the different parts to the home screen using string, although a computer would do it automatically. When we had a completed set of planets and a few extra pictures, such as an astronaut, we scanned them in to the computer system. Jim then showed us how to edit them before we transferred them to the next computer program we needed to make the app. We then ordered them and made the links between each page to complete our app. After we had completed our work each week, we were allowed to play on the games in The CTRL Pad. In recent weeks, pupils from across the school have been putting the finishing touches to our elephant, Salma, ready for her appearance in Elmer's Great North Parade. After school-wide design and name competitions that involved over half of our pupils, a selection of around 30 pupils from Years 1 to 6 got to work painting the winning design which was an amalgamation of Harcharndeep and Zeynab's ideas. A selection of paints, tools and techniques were used by students under the supervision of Ms McCarthy and Mr MacLeod, who are both extremely proud of what the children have achieved. The finished piece is stunning and wowed all that have seen her, but unfortunately we are under strict instructions not to reveal her until the parade starts in the August.

The trail, in aid of St. Oswald's Hospice, will feature our Salma alongside over 150 other elephant sculptures based on the beloved and iconic children's character; Elmer Elephant. The sculptures, together with an app or map, will take visitors on a tour of the region from beaches to city centres via forests, parks and attractions and is free to take part in. It runs from 21st August until the end of October, which makes the summer holiday and October half term ideal opportunities for pupils and their families to join the other 700,000 visitors expected on the trail.
