Welcome to the first newsletter of 2022-23. This year, we feel like we are operating as normal with the re-introduction of large gatherings in school. We had two very successful parents' evenings in October, where we saw more than 90% of our families, which is fantastic. During the sessions, parents were given the opportunity to look through the English, maths, sketch and creative curriculum books, whilst waiting to see the teacher. Then, during the one-to-one sessions with teachers, I hope you were able to raise any questions you may have had whilst hearing about progress and next steps for your child. We have two further parents' evenings on 22nd and 23rd March, 2023, so please save the dates. Obviously, if you have any further questions, please do not hesitate to speak to one of us outside school in the morning, or make an appointment by visiting the school office or giving us a call. We have also restarted our class assemblies, where the children share with the audience their learning. So far, we have had four assemblies from Y5 and Y6. Y6 children shared with us how it was to live as a Victorian child, and Y5KS shared their knowledge of the Global Development Goals, and how we link them in our curriculum. Whilst Y5CB looked at the benefits of having a growth mindset as opposed to a fixed mindset. Again, these were very well attended and we look forward to welcoming you to the future Friday class assemblies in 2023.

In the last couple of weeks, we have been fully embracing the festivities. Our School Choir have been out and about across Newcastle performing in various locations. We have also had several performances in the hall. The first one was from the Rocksteady Music Bands, who showed us the progress they have made with their musical instruments. We then had two performances from the Early Years' Team where they shared with us The A to Z of Christmas, which demonstrated the message of all of us working together as a team. Key Stage One then presented 'Hey Ewe' which told us the tale of a very curious little sheep. Finally, Key Stage Two shared with us 'Christmas Around the World.' I was so proud of all of our pupils who had worked so hard to learn an amazing number of lines, and I know many of you were suitably impressed too. Thank you for all your kind messages of support. I really appreciate it. Like I shared after each performance, we were telling the story of Christmas, and whilst we appreciate many of our school family may not celebrate this festival, it is about all of us gaining knowledge about different religions and festivals associated with each one. We are all different, we join our Wingrove family, where we celebrate difference and what really matters is what is in your heart and how you treat others. 'NU' FOOTBALL BOOTS

"In December, thirty lucky children from across the school were chosen to attend NUCASTLE (Newcastle United Foundation's fantastic new community hub) to collect a new pair of football boots to keep. Thanks to the fantastic work of the Newcastle United Foundation, in partnership with the Michael Carrick Foundation, hundreds of pairs of

football boots were made available to schools in the local area. We met Sarah Burn of the Newcastle United Foundation, who was co-ordinating the project, and she talked us through the different boot sizes and brands on offer, as well as which boots would work best for different surfaces. For example, some boots are suitable for wet grass and some are only for use on AstroTurf pitches. We were allowed to select our own boots, and nearly all of us tried on at least 5 or 6 pairs to make sure they were suitable! We had a fantastic morning and we hope this opportunity is offered to us in years to come." - Fola, Y4

Following great success with their Kindfulness sessions for Key Stage One last year, we have welcomed back Katy and Amy from Cornerstone this term to work with Year 2. This year, they are focussing on the idea of a Kindful Kitchen. There will be six sessions across the year, with the first one having taken place in November. The sessions explore mindful cooking and eating, with a specific food chosen each time where its origins are discussed and how it is used in cooking, before the children are able to cook with it. Global Goals & FareShare


